

## MINUTES OF THE 2007 SCALE SECTION AGM

## HELD AT THE CRICKET PAVILLION, HORDLE ON WEDNESDAY 4th April 2007

**Present.** David McNair-Taylor (Scale Captain), Peter Soffe, John Frost, Peter Oram, Andrew Davis, Lorna Soffe, and 20 members.

Apologies. Received from Sheila Soffe, John Sherwood, Mike Hammond and Don Scott.

<u>Minutes of last Meeting.</u> Minutes of the 2006 AGM were read and approved. Proposed Ray Hellicar, Seconded Brian Severn

Matters Arising. None raised.

<u>Captains Report.</u> The Captain told members that the club had gone from strength to strength over the past year and that membership was still being managed to keep it below 100 maximum, the present membership total being 96 with a waiting list of 6, with 75 members already paid up for 2007, the deadline being 31 May; it was expected that there would be a few non renewals that may clear the waiting list.

Attendance on both Thursdays and Sundays had been excellent and consistent even over the winter months despite low water levels. It is pleasing to see that the lake is now really full and should give us a good start to the season. The captain expressed his thanks to John Frost and Andrew Davis for their efforts in running the Steering Competitions and it was agreed that the large and small boat formats would be continued. Peter Oram was thanked for his sterling work running the frequency board, etc. on Thursdays. The Xmas Lunch had proved a great success being a record attendance of 50, and with people waiting for places; it was regrettable that the hotel had placed a limit on places available and steps have been taken to resolve the situation for 2007. The captain thanked Mike Hammond for his excellent work in negotiating and organising the event. Peter Soffe was thanked for his work in maintaining the harbour and notice boards etc. Last but not least the captain thanked Lorna Soffe for all her support and hard work as Treasurer.

EVENTS IN 2006: The Highcliffe show had been a great success with 74 boats on display and raised a record £512 for the RNLI. The Calshot Lifeboat day had also been very well attended with 70 boats on display, the day had raised £1700 for the RNLI, Marwell Zoo had not been so well attended with only 18 boats and Model World at Romsey had a record attendance by club members: despite extra tables we still had a problem getting all the 50 exhibits on display, extra tables have been requested for 2007. The Captain thanked members for the donations to the Xmas Raffle and reported that £60 had been donated to the Lymington Hospital and £60 to the RNLI. The report was accepted: Proposed Don Brazier, Seconded Roger Yeatman.

<u>Treasurers Report.</u> (See attached balance sheet) The Club was in a good position financially: Main Points: The extra cost of insurance had been covered, increased lake hire fee, slight profit from sale of shirts, caps and aerial protectors, drinks for Xmas Lunch subsidised, club had purchased new exhibition tables and a gazebo. Balance in bank at end of year £314.30. The report was accepted: Proposed Don Brazier, Seconded John Nixon.

<u>Election of Officers and Committee.</u> David McNair-Taylor and existing Committee were re-elected there being no additional nominations. Proposed Don Brazier, Seconded Bob Eaton.

Lorna Soffe was elected on to the Committee as a full committee member and Treasurer (having been seconded only for 2006): Proposed Roger Yeatman, Seconded Brian Severn.

#### RULES AMENDMENTS.

(1) The captain explained the new regulations regarding supervision of young persons under 16 required by law and that the club was unable to provide a trained member to supervise unattended young persons, a rule amendment was agreed stating that all member's children under the age of 16 must be accompanied by a parent, guardian or carer: Proposed Brian Severn, Seconded John Nixon.

(2) It was agreed that 25Khz transmitters be added to the approved list, no formal rule amendment required

#### NON MEMBERS USE OF LAKE ON CLUB DAYS.

The captain explained that the clubs permit from the Forestry Commission gave exclusive use of they lake on club days and that recent events had proved that we need to ensure that all users of the lake on club days are insured. A letter has been sent to the Forestry seeking approval to request non members who wish to sail on club days pay a nominal £1.50 to cover club insurance and sign in as visitors also to be issued with a sheet of rules regarding the use of the lake etc. A reply had not yet been received but telephone conversations and indicated that approval would be given.

**EVENTS** for 2007. the captain outlined the events already booked and the probability of a club fun day at the lake with a BBO etc was discussed. Members agreed that this would be arranged by the committee.

Ray Hellicar proposed a vote of thanks to the Captain and Committee for their work in 2006. There being no other business the meeting closed at 8.45 pm.

#### **Editorial**

Many thanks for the positive response I received for the last newsletter, however future newsletters depend on you, they can only be as good as what you submit... let's face it I've already given you my one decent "Hint and Tips" idea! This month we have a contribution on Hovercraft from Peter Bryant and the first of an intriguing series of "Peter's Toolbox" tips from Peter Oram.



I only impose this picture on you so that you can recognise me at the pond and give me your valuable contributions!

With regard to my "Smoke Generator" article, Alan Bond has contacted me to suggest that if a power surge during switch on is a problem, a much better solution than my use of potentiometers is to use

"negative temperature coefficient (NTC) thermistors". These are connected in series with the load. At switch on the thermistor is cold and therefore it has a high resistance which limits the current. Then as the current flows, the high resistance causes the thermistor to heat up, its resistance then drops and very nearly the full voltage is applied to the circuit. Alan can supply more details of part numbers and source if you want to use this technique. Incidentally, it turns out that Alan and I both did our first degrees at Imperial College, London, at very nearly the same time and, although in different years, lived in the same Hall of Residence!

# **Hints and Tips Model Hovercraft (from Pete Bryant)**

Several people down at the pond have taken an interest in my hovercraft so I thought I would write an article on them. I started building model hovercraft as I was looking for something different and out of the ordinary. As I live in Salisbury I needed something I could also operate away from the pond. This type of craft certainly appeared to fit the bill.

Basically there are two types of real hovercraft, so models follow the same pattern. First there is the type, which has one single motor, which drives a large propeller in a single duct at the rear of the craft. Some of the airflow is then diverted through a splitter plate in the bottom of the duct. About a third of the air goes down into the skirt and exits under the craft where the air cushion is formed. The rest of the air is used to propel the craft forward. With this type it is not possible to fully hover when static as there will always be air-pushing foreword. This type of craft is like the one in picture left. It is the type of model I have taken to Calshot RNLI day and to Setley pond.



Flying this sort of craft is fairly difficult as you have less control. You have to go to two-thirds power just to inflate the skirt and form the air cushion. The craft then starts to move and can then go on full power. When stopping, the tendency is to shut everything down and she just grinds to a halt and sits on the water. Turning is easy as it can turn more or less in it's own length. It does however have a tendency to want to flip over, especially in rough conditions. As it has a large 9-inch propeller things can also get hot. The motor in mine has been recorded pulling over 30 Amps. Recently on my new Aero Racer I had smoke coming out of it when a connector melted.

The other type of hovercraft (see picture below) is like the passenger ones we see locally. They have a separate lift system to the main propulsion unit. The model can do anything a real one can do. The model construction is also the same with separate air ducts for lift and propulsion. When the skirt is removed the frame is the same as on the old SRN6 hovercraft. I know this as I got under one and had a look.



For a model hovercraft this is the best sort to build. However it is much more difficult to construct and needs practice to operate. Flying this type of model can be more fun as you have a lot more control. You can do anything the real one does with practice. It can be hovered whilst the craft is stationary. You can pull away

gently increasing speed as you go. When stopping you can slow it on the main motor and in emergency reduce the pressure in the skirt so as to act as an additional brake. Turning is also easier. As you become more experienced you soon learn to master using the skirt pressure in combination to the rudders and main propulsion unit to control the craft. It may sound complicated but it is not. I would think that anyone who operates a model sailing craft would need a lot more skill than I would with the hovercraft.

Model hovercraft are also easier to operate on water than on land. This is because the air under the craft takes a different form. On water the air forms a shape of an upturned saucer with most of the air being distributed around the inner edge of the skirt under the plenum and the water being pushed to the centre. On land the air is

simply directed straight down. Believe me there is a noticeable difference.

Both of the pictured craft have been disposed of. The camouflaged one was written off due to a design fault, which caused it to break its back at a certain weak point. The designer has modified the kit and supplied me with a new craft. The larger one was used at the school where I work and was used during lessons. It's great being paid to do you hobby. It was never put on water and only operated on the tennis courts. It ended up needing the skirt replacing due to misuse. As I had made several mistakes in the construction I decided it was more economical to give it away rather than do repairs. I stripped it of all electronics and gave it to the school. They got it going as a project and it is still operational to this day but seldom used owing to insurance problems. While on the subject of insurance you are covered by the Club's insurance (see below), however, as I am a member of the Model Hovercraft Association I also have extra cover.

I am now in the process of building a new hovercraft. This one will be 42 inches long and 18 inches wide. Propulsion will be by a 9-volt brush less motor driving a 7-inch propeller with forward and reverse thrust. A brushed 600 motor driving a 6-inch propeller will provide lift. Like the experimental one I operate it will be giro stabilised so as to keep the craft in a straight line. This takes a lot of the workload off of the operator when flying. With the giro disengaged you are constantly trying to correct the movement left and right and in doing so tend to keep over correcting the rudder. This causing in turn causes it to zig zag uncontrollably. The new craft will be constructed using 0.04 and 0.08mm plywood and 6mm balsa strip. The skirt will be made form Rip Stop Nylon. Hopefully I can keep the weight down to around 8 lbs gross. Having said that I do know of a person who is operating a similar size craft weighing 12 lbs.



The 0.04mm stuff costs £11.99 for a 12 x 48 inch sheet, he sent me a sample - it, and the thicker variants, look like really good modelling material, much better to work with than thin balsa or basswood. Pete buys it from Spire models, which is a specialist model glider shop (38 Napier Crescent, Laverstock, Salisbury, Wilts, SP1 1PL. http://www.spiremodels.com/ Phone: 01722 415541); or you could try your local model plane shop]


## Peter's Toolbox...

## CHRISTMAS LUNCH 2008 - new ideas from Mike Hammond.

[Editors comment... The "C word" already... Aargh!!! At this rate you'll be getting the RNLI Christmas Gift Catalogue through your letter box tomorrow! ...but sorry Mike, please continue:]

I feel that it is time for a change to the current theme and venue in the light of our present increased membership, and the ever rising cost of Restaurant meals and bar prices. The likely cost per head at South Lawns Hotel this year would be around £24, and with a drink at the Bar, we are up to £27 which is too high for many of our members especially with Christmas approaching and all the usual commitments at that time of year.

With about 56 seats taken up at the last two lunches, and half of those taken by members' wives, it means that we are currently attracting only 25% of the membership, and many of those attending are not regular attendees to the "Pond". Of course one doesn't need to attend the boating activities to qualify for membership and therefore the social events on offer, but as an active club, it is the Committee's duty to encourage the members who actively engage in boating activities on a regular basis.

An alternative venue could be the "Hare and Hounds" Pub on the outskirts of Sway, which is about a mile from Setley pond. They could offer us a sit-down Christmas Lunch (Turkey) for 35/40 people at around £16.50 per head and you buy your own drinks to suit your pocket. Maybe we could link this to a morning's boating at the pond (weather permitting), and any non-booked members who decided that they wanted to come at the last minute could still take pot-luck with a Bar meal. This could be a more informal gathering, which might appeal to a wider membership?

The main problem would be parking, and cars might have to be left on the road some distance away.

Another alternative could be a "Skittles Evening" at the "Hoburne Caravan Park" in Highcliffe. They can offer us a One-course light meal (Fish, Scampi, Sausage, & Chips, Ham & Salad, etc.) at around £8, and this would give us the use of a large private function room with Bar and two skittle alleys. This would cater for between 35 to 90 and would be more suitable for a broader spectrum of members and also wives, and would encourage people to mix! The "skittles" is only a fun thing as the alleys are only of a temporary nature and skill would probably be a disadvantage! I do appreciate that it is a long way for some people to travel, but there is easy access from the A35, and ample parking.

What ever is decided, in the future, payment in full will be required at the time of the booking as the experience has been that certain members are reluctant to part with their money by a requested date, and considerable time and effort has been put in by some committee members to obtain payment in order to confirm bookings with the venue. Also, last year, some members booked twice with entirely different choice of menu, others didn't complete their choice, and finally others decided to cancel at the last minute having failed to pay at all!

We will return to the earlier system, where the final details and cost will be published in the Summer/Autumn Newsletter, with a tear-off sheet with your choices to be filled in and returned to me along with your cheque for payment in full, and refunds will only be made at the Committee's discretion.

I urge all members to think about this, and those who are likely to support our club and this annual Social Function to fill in their order of preference for the three locations and associated cost. The final decision will be made at the AGM, but the more feedback that we can get beforehand (particularly if you won't get to the AGM) will help to choose the most popular choice for the festive event.

## **Club Insurance policy**

A member has requested details of the Club Insurance. Arranged through SWAMBC, the policy is outlined below. If you need to prove details of cover to use the facilities of another club, David can supply a certificate; however the following details (reproduced here in full), with a club membership card should normally be sufficient. In general, members do not need a separate certificate, just your membership card.

Name & Address of Insured: Solent Radio Controlled M Y C and/or individual members for their respective rights and interests

Location: Setley Pond, Setley Nr Brockenhurst and elsewhere in the United Kingdom and Europe

Insurer: Royal & Sun Alliance Insurance PLC. Policy Number: RTT127552/SW024.

Period of Insurance: 01/02/08 to 01/02/09

**Limit of Indemnity:** £2000000 any one event (inc. sparks & ashes and boiler explosion) Cover extends to include any public authority whose facilities are being used by the insured. Indemnity to principals is automatically provided (e.g. private landowners, host modelling/model engineering clubs or societies)

**Loss or damage resulting from Boiler Explosion:** The insurers shall not be liable for Injury or damage caused by boiler or pressure vessel explosion unless:

- a) the boiler or pressure vessel concerned has at the time of the incident a valid thorough examination certificate issued against a suitable Written Scheme of Examination drawn up by either an inspection authority affiliated to the Safety Assessment Federation (SAFed) or by the National Traction Engine Trust or:
- b) the boiler or pressure vessel concerned has at the time of the incident a valid certificate of hydraulic test and a valid certificate of annual examination and steam test both issuedfollowing examinations

conforming with the Examination and Testing of Miniature Steam Boilers (New Edition 2006) and any subsequent revisions or:

c) the vessel concerned is a small boiler namely that it has a capacity of not more than 3 bar litres or the vessel concerned is a gas tank with a capacity of not more than 180ml when cover shall be in force whether or not a valid thorough examination certificate has been issued or been issued.

**Driving (model locomotives up to 15" gauge):** Within the geographical limits of the policy the insured may drive any model owned by him/her and also any model not owned by him/her but being driven by him/her with the owner's consent. A model owned by the insured may be driven by any person who is driving on the insured's order or with his/her permission. There is no upper age limit for drivers. Cover extends to include gas turbine powered locomotives. The policy does not provide any cover as required by the Road Traffic Act.

**Use (model locomotives up to 15" gauge):** A driver age 16 or over may carry passengers either gratuitously or fare paying provided the driver receives no remuneration either monetary or in kind other than reasonable out of pocket expenses and/or supply of fuel. A driver under the age of 16 may carry as passengers, the insured, members of their own family and if the under age 16 driver is a member of a bona fide model engineering club or society, fellow members of that or other bona fide model engineering clubs or societies providing the under age 16 driver is supervised by a responsible and competent driver age 16 or over and all reasonable precautions are taken. Use for hire or reward or any personal business purpose is excluded.

**Model Boats:** A model boat is a boat which because of its small size is incapable of sailing whilst carrying a person. Cover extends to include model boats powered by electric, clockwork or rubber motors, sail, steam, or internal combustion controlled by the insured or by any person with the owner's consent.

**Model Air Cushioned Vehicles:** Cover extends to include model air cushioned vehicles powered by electric, clockwork or rubber motors, or internal combustion engines not exceeding 40cc capacity, controlled by the insured or by any person with the owner's consent.

**Model Aircraft:** Cover extends to include model aircraft including those powered by rubber motors, internal combustion engines or propelled electrically excluding any kind of rocket or pulse jet unit, gas turbine or turbojet other than 'Jetex' power units. Model aircraft powered by internal combustion engines are restricted to the following: -

- a) Radio Controlled total engine capacity up to but not exceeding 40cc
- b) Free Flight total engine capacity up to but not exceeding 10cc
- c) Line Controlled Total engine capacity up to but not exceeding 40cc

Cover extends to include model aircraft flying from M.O.D. property, to include instructors providing model flying training for financial gain and the interest of the Secretary of State for Defence is noted

Special Note: Cover under this policy <u>does not</u> provide cover for any liability arising out of a members own personal Garden Railway which is greater than 2.5" gauge or a members own personal Portable Track which is greater than 2.5" gauge or if a member is borrowing someone else's Portable Track which is greater than 2.5" gauge and the member is using that Portable Track for purposes other than those of Solent Radio Controlled M Y C
